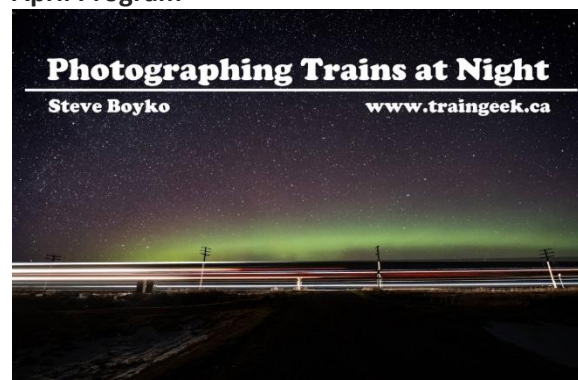

The March Photo prize was won by Ian Plett.

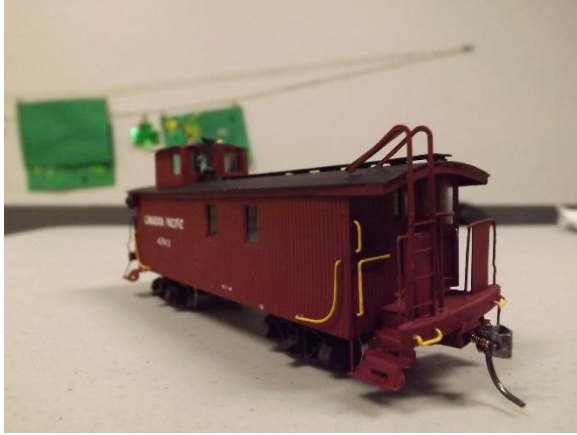

Brass Caboose Kit – Purchased (\$5.00) a brass caboose kit at one of Marvin Fetch's sales. Flat etched brass parts, wire, shaped brass rod. Roof and cupola roof pre-curved. Windows and doors need to be cut out and cleaned with files. Pattern provided for handrails and wire supplied. Ladders a separate brass kit. All parts soldered, floor built up with extrusions. Soaked in lacquer thinner to remove varnish and solder rosin. Primed with Tamiya liquid Surface Primer. Sprayed with AK acrylic Burnt Red and Black. Handrails hand painted Vallejo Golden Yellow. LED lighting installed with a homemade keep alive circuit and Kaydee powered trucks. Lanterns, with LEDs, from Model Train Technology. Decals and screen doors from Black Cat. Challenging kit. Parts become "unsoldered" as you solder the next part. Upside, you can always go back and Re-do something. Model by Neil Carleton.



1:450 or 1:480 Scale. T gauge (1:450 or 1:480) is a model railway scale with a track gauge of 3mm (0.118"), referred from "Three-millimeter gauge" or Third of N scale." It was introduced at

Window Glass 101

When you're building your models, do you use the kit-supplied acetate windows? Do you create your own acetate windows? Have you found that glueing the acetate in place can be a "chore"? Have you, as I recently did, put a model together and forgotten to put in the windows after assembling everything?

I recently assembled an Athearn SD-40 in readiness for the WMRC Spring Show Model Contest. After putting everything together, I realized to my chagrin that I had omitted to place acetate windows in the cab. Good grief. Oh, well, carry on and weather the locomotive – openings for windows and all – and hope for the best by the Judges.

Then two weeks ago I found a wonderful product on the internet: *Microscale Industries Inc. MICRO KRISTAL KLEAR*. I contacted the WMRC’s advertising Hobby Shop – Frog and Diamond Hobbyworks – and found out the product was on hand. After purchasing a bottle, I then tried it.

To say that I am impressed is an understatement.

Holding a toothpick in as flat a position as possible to the opening, draw it across, from one side of the opening to the other. This creates a “bubble” of film that fills the opening, which dries into a very thin and clear window of scale thickness.

Following the easy-to-understand instructions on the bottle, the model was set aside, and in a few hours the windows were there. Amazing! The white glue-like liquid had transformed into clear “glass” windows!

BONUSES: As an adhesive for mounting clear windows, etc. on models, the clear parts can be joined to the painted parts with a completely clear adhesive. You do not have to mask around the clear parts any more! The painted windowsills can be seen through for the most realistic looking windows possible on a model. It can also be used to make lenses, both clear and colored, with the addition of a little food coloring.

Building a Monopole Billboard

Dave Ackmann’s presentation on Custom Billboards at the last WRMC meeting got me thinking about building a billboard for my layout. There are several styles of billboards beside the wood frame Circus style Dave presented. A billboard has two components the display and structure. I decided on a Monopole design as it appeared easy to construct. I made mine out of Evergreen Scale Model polystyrene which is easy to cut and glue. I was not concerned about it being to scale as long as it looked visually good on my layout. The technique used to make the display is applicable

to all kinds of signs and billboards. The display can have text, images and/or logo. You should stick to seven words or less for the text. What would my billboard's theme be? I did an internet search for ideas and came across all sorts of interesting photos or ads for a billboard which I saved to my computer. I decided to design and build a CN billboard for my layout as my layout is a CN and BNSF theme.

To design and layout the display, MS Word was used. This allowed several billboard displays to be layout per page in order to optimize the decal paper. Decal paper is relatively expensive. A text box was constructed for each billboard panel display. Each billboard display panel was sized based on the its unique content. Within each text box panel, sub-text boxes were inserted to allow for multiple images and/or text.

For my example, a CN billboard, the CN logo and locomotive image were obtained from a railroad sign Canadian National Railroad Heritage /Train Wall Art (on eBay). The images were inserted into the text box panel. Text was also added on the objective of CN. Once a page of billboards was laid out, they were printed on LaserJet clear decal paper (Amazon). After printing the billboard decal(s), *Mr. SUPER CLEAR SEMI -GLOSS* was applied to protect the water-based inks (Hobby Sense ... <https://hobbysense.ca/products/mr-hobby-clear-sprays?variant=43911711981791>). First, a mist spray of one light coat is applied over the sheet. After about five minutes, another light mist spray is applied. After another five minutes, a third mist coat is applied. You're all set to cut out your billboard decals and apply them to the display panel.

The billboard decal was mounted on a panel made from a sheet of Evergreen Scale Model polystyrene. The panel's surface was cleaned to remove any grease, dirt, and dust that might prevent the decal sticking. The decal was soaked in water for around 30 seconds. For better adhesion warm water was used. The panel surface was wetted to allow easier maneuvering and positioning of the decal. The

soaked decal was placed onto the display panel image side facing up. The backing paper was slipped off. All water bubbles were removed and the decal was let dry.

To protect and help blend the decal to the display board, it is suggested that *Vallejo Decal Fix* (found at Hobby Sense, <https://hobbysense.ca/products/vallejo-auxiliary-products?variant=31244081692783>) be used. It can also be used to prepare the panel's decal surface. It cleans the panel surface, improves decal adherence, prevents air bubbles, smooths decal edges, and protects decals. How to use it:

Apply Decal Fix to the model surface with a soft brush

Allow the Decal Fix to dry

Place the decal on the model

Apply Decal Fix over the decal

Press down on the decal with a finger or humid cloth to remove excess liquid

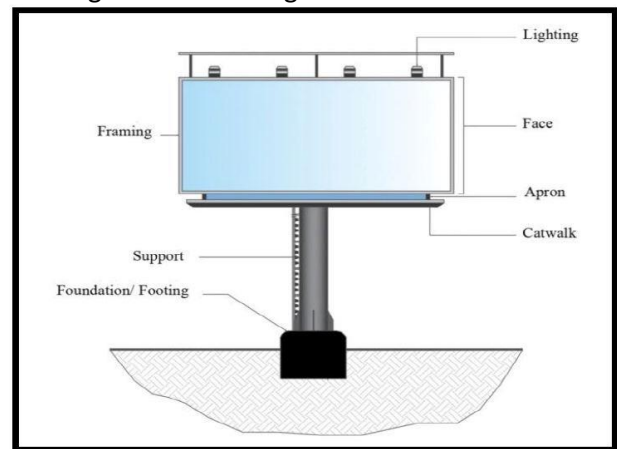


Figure 1: Billboard Components

The next step was to construct the Monopole billboard. The basic components of a billboard are: a display panel, support, catwalk, lights and framing as shown on Figure 1.

The support pole was made out of a section of half inch diameter polystyrene tube (Evergreen, Item 236). The display panel was glued to the polystyrene tube. Angle channel (Evergreen,

Item 297) was glued to the sides of the tube to increase the attaching surface to the display panel and the rigidity of the connection. The catwalk was made by gluing a section of angle channel along the bottom of the display panel. Onto the angle channel, a strip of rectangular styrene was glued to simulate a catwalk. I didn't think framing or an apron was necessary. For lighting, stainless steel miniature street lamp posts with 3V LED lighting were used (Temu, AliExpress). The light poles were shorted by removing the bottom section of the pole. The lights were attached to the back of the pole with super glue. A nano ATMEGA328P was used to power the lights. The light wiring with a resistor was run through the support pole to the nano.

My CN Monopole Billboard is shown on Figure 2. It was easy to built using material I readily had on hand. The white Evergreen Scale Model polystyrene makes the billboard stand out on my layout.

I might even be convinced to go out of town on a road trip to Argyle and St. Andrews! Sorry, but folks from Steinbach will have to be at the show early on the Saturday morning.

Come on Members, show your models off! You're proud of them – why not let other Members and the Public enjoy them as well!

**Categories are: Motive Power (3 for certain at this time), Rolling Stock (2 for right now),*

Structures (1 for sure, but it's suspected there will be at least 2 more), Displays (1 guaranteed), and Special Event (1 definitely, but there are definitely going to be others!)

Model Contest Tips

This is adapted from one written in 2015 by long-time WMRC Member Morgan Turney - WMRC Model Contest Chairperson in 2015. So, you want to enter a model in the WMRC Model Contest. **That is EXCELLENT!** The Winnipeg Model Railroad Club hosts its annual Model (and Photo) Contest each year at the Club's Open House in the Spring. Why? It's an opportunity for Club Members to highlight their modelling skills to others, and perhaps learn some techniques for the future. It has been a tradition in the Club since its beginnings and some years ago trophies were developed to honour modeling (and photographic) achievement.

At one time when the Club membership was well over 150, there were several categories for the Model Contest with several entries in each one. The Club had trophies, but it was found that most winners did not want to take them home from the Annual Dinner. In a few cases some were damaged. Plaques and personalized *Certificates of Merit* were initiated and in keeping with the changes in the National Model Railroad Association (NMRA), the number of categories was reduced. In keeping with the NMRA, the Club also started incorporating a Scratchbuilt judging area.

There are now five categories for the Model Contest: Motive Power; Rolling Stock; Structures; Displays; and the Annual Special Event. To avoid any confusion, Motive Power includes any type of steam, diesel, or electric locomotive, traction unit, maintenance vehicle, or other type of self-propelled vehicle that runs on rails. This includes everything from "speeders" to "Big Boys" and includes unpowered models of powered prototypes (dummy locomotives). Rolling Stock is just about anything that runs on rails and is not self-

propelled. This includes freight, non-revenue, and passenger cars of any kind including baggage cars, RPO cars, business cars, and cabooses as well as hand cars.

Many modellers enjoy showing and sharing their models and the Spring Show and Model Contest is the perfect venue for this. To select which models in their respective categories are plaque and *Certificate of Merit* winners, the Club utilizes a point system that has been adapted from the NMRA. The NMRA "Achievement Program Judging Guidelines" are complex; the Club uses a much simpler evaluation. Regardless, there are some easy "rules" to follow for you to earn the points necessary to win a 1st, 2nd, or 3rd Place Plaque and Certificate of Merit!

All five model categories are judged basically in the same manner. Of course, the idea is to accumulate as many points as possible in five different areas. The five areas in each Category for Judging are: Construction; Detail; Conformity; Finish and Lettering; and Scratchbuilding. Regardless of the category of modelling or the area of judging, entries can be kit built, scratchbuilt, or a combination of both.

Simply put, the more work you have put into the model, the more points that will be awarded in each respective area of judging. Keep in mind that it's not just one Judge who evaluates your model in all areas. Judge A will only judge the Construction area of each model. Judge B is only going to look at Details for all the models. Since each Judge only has a score sheet for their specific area e.g., Construction, they have no idea what is being entered by Judge B. There are five Judges looking at the same models but with different judging criteria, and not knowing what is being scored by the other four.

Here are the first two tips. One; enter every Category that you can. Why? If nobody enters anything for Rolling Stock and yours is the only one, you win First Place! If only you and one other enter Motive Power one of you is going to

receive First Place and the other will be Second Place!

And the second tip? When you provide your Entry Form you will also have to complete a Judge's Score Sheet. The first lets the Judges know what your name is and which of the five categories you're entering a

Judging Procedures for Annual Photo Contest

Prints may be mounted on flat rigid cardboard (no folders or glass frames). Photo and/or mount may not exceed 12" x 16" (30cm x 40cm) in size. Minimum mount size is 8" by 10" (20cm x 25cm) and minimum print size is 5" x 7" (13cm x 18cm).

The Photo Contest Chairman shall select a panel of at least three judges. Judges selected ideally should have both some ability in judging photographic techniques and an appreciation of the aims of model railroading.

Experience has indicated that the judging is best done on a group basis with the objective of eliminating the "also-ran" photos early. The following judging system (called the Melbourne System) has been used in competitive camera club settings for any years.

Each judge is to go through the category individually to decide which photos he thinks should be included in the finals. The judges then get together to compare results. Any photos that have the support of all the judges are automatically in the finals. Any that have the support of only one or two judges are discussed and may be put in the finals if the judges agree.

At this point most photo contests should be down to the top 12 or so entries. The judges must review the photos until they come to a consensus as to their order of finish. Usually this is a matter of considerable discussion and different teams of judges will likely produce different results. This is not surprising as photos are a very subjective medium.

Similarly, after all the categories have been judged, the judges must go through the same judgment process to determine the Best-in-Show from amongst all the First Place Award winners. Best-in-Show is then removed from its category and the other winners moved up one place.

Judging Factors

As stated above and as is evident to the experienced observer, photo contests are much more subjective than the model contest event. This is because a prize-winning photo is perhaps more a matter of art and luck than execution of technique. Certainly, the photographer is faced with more things that are beyond his control than the model builder.

Notwithstanding this subjectivity, there are some judging factors that are brought to bear by the experienced Photo Contest Judge, these will be given an appropriate, albeit intuitive, weighting as the judges on the panel come to their consensus.

IMPACT: This is best explained when a photo evokes comments such as **“I wish I’d taken that picture”**. Given a choice, action is preferable to a static scene; rare or unusual equipment is more interesting than the ordinary. In model photography, the choice of the model will contribute to the impact of the picture. Does the photographer reveal obvious distracting modelling flaws or has the photographer taken pains to be sure that all of the elements shown work together to produce a pleasing result. When the environment is exceptional or the viewpoint makes the ordinary, extraordinary. Full credit should be given for the contribution the photographer’s sensitivity brought to the subject.

COMPOSITION: The arrangement of the forms within the photos should be pleasing to the eye. How well did the photographer use the available space within his format and did he or she follow the guidelines as taught in art and photography

courses? If the rules were broken, did the result justify that decision?

ARTISTIC APPROACH: This is a rather subjective area where a strongly graphic or symbolic composition may move one judge and a ‘typical calendar shot’ may be more moving to another. One tends to evaluate artistic and aesthetic qualities on the basis of one’s own experience. What moves us and the degree to which we are impressed will change as we are exposed to more and better images. A judge should not start out looking for a special kind of artistry. To do so would be imposing his or her own values, sensibilities and preconceptions.

LIGHTING: In photography. ‘Light is law’. It is the only thing that makes it possible for us to expose film. If it is skillfully handled the result can be a work of art, if badly handled the result can be total failure or maybe a snapshot at best. A model shot made on-camera flash and no background light would be a snapshot. The photographer should be given full credit for his or her use of multiple flash or off camera flash and supplemental reflectors or a well-developed room lighting system depending on the quality of execution. Natural sunlight should be superior to many flash systems, but can and often is badly handled. The best execution of any lighting system in model photography is one that produces a realistic, natural appearance without multiple shadows (there can be only one sun) and without excessively harsh contrast and black holes devoid of detail.

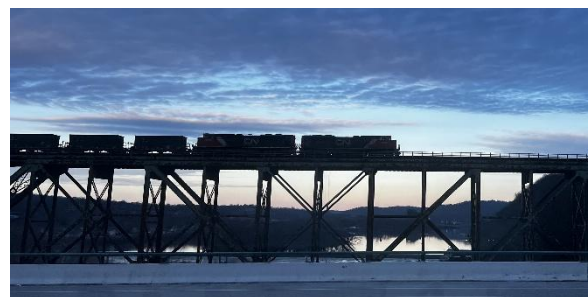
